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

Please provide comments on any aspect of the subject matter of this textbook.

- I have some minor differences with the authors about terminology (i.e., I use "thesis statement" to refer to a preview of the speaker's main points) and content (i.e., I think Aristotle's artistic proofs logos, ethos, and pathos are a cornerstone of persuasion and should be included in the persuasion chapter), but these differences are minor because they are easily fixable and common in the discipline.
- I use this book in my own class currently and it's not difficult to add articles and videos about logos, ethos, and pathos to my learning modules. It's a bit more difficult to get students to understand that the term "thesis statement" is being used differently in the class than it is in the textbook, so I use a custom-published version of this book through Flat World Knowledge so I can make the change myself.

Please provide comments on any aspect of the subject matter of this textbook.

- I think the material in this book is challenging enough for any lower-division college student, but accessible enough for students at the community college who may not currently meet college-level reading requirements.
- Adding a clickable table of contents at the beginning of the book would alleviate my concerns about the organization. Right now, the book opens into chapter 1 without an explanation of the content. Students need to navigate through the entire book to find what they are looking for.
- The major reason I use a version of this book through Flat World Knowledge is that there are no ancillary materials in the OER (.pdf) version. My students tend to understand content better when they can take practice quizzes before their module quizzes. I also don't really have the time to build my own test bank, so I rely on the publishers to create a test bank that I can integrate into my Blackboard shell, edit, and add to.

- The writing style in this book is excellent. It's enjoyable to read and the design features text broken up by graphics.
- As I mentioned above, the .pdf lacks a table of contents so it's difficult to find what you need if you don't know where to search for it. However, there are hyperlinked citations which is a nice interactive feature.
- There are a few instances where hyperlinks lead the reader out into multimedia content.
  However, the book would be much stronger with embedded videos and animations. I work
  around this in my class by adding videos and short online articles into my online learning
  modules to supplement the primarily text-based content of the book.

If students download the book, they can add sticky notes and highlight in their own copy. Instructors can do the same, but they can't modify a copy and share it with students easily. This is one reason why I use the Flat World Knowledge version of the book, because the edits I make create a customized version that my students see.

- I currently offer my students this .pdf if they cannot afford the custom published version of our book through Flat World Knowledge. I would switch to the OER version of the book completely if:
  - study resources were included for students
  - an instructor test bank was included for faculty
  - the format was editable so I could easily remove content we don't cover in the course, change key terms to fit the vocabulary I use, and add supplemental content where I want to.
  - a hyperlinked table of contents was added to increase ease of navigation.
